Beaton, M.C. – DEATH OF A CHIMNEY SWEEP – 3.0 Typical Hamish Macbeth – but always an easy read and an enjoyable cozy.

Coben, Harlan - LIVE WIRE - 4.0

One more Myron Bolitar trying to rescue his client. Finds a brother. I don'nt remember his holding Win back in earlier books. Win is remembered for always saying "It's sure nice to be rich!"

DeSilva, Bruce - ROGUE ISLAND - 4.0

Providence, RI is being burned down- one house at a time in an area called Mount Hope. The protagonist is a newspaper reporter and he sets out to uncover a plot.

Elkins, Aaron – THE WORST THING – 5.0

Story centers around kidnapping and how to avoid them. Has a surprise ending.

Harris, Rosemary – SLUGFEST – 2.5

No murder until page 117 and the ending was very poor.

Havill, Steven – BEFORE SHE DIES – 4.5

Police procedural..-could have done without the officers use of carphones.

Havill, Steven – CONVENIENT DISPOSAL - 5.0 High school students are carrying sharpened hat pins to school to use in fights. Two girls have been suspended and one of the girls is attacked at home. A neighbor, the county manager disappears and may be a suspect. Estelle Reyes-Guzman investigates.

Havill, Steven – DEAD WEIGHT - 5.0 Yet another is this outstanding series.

Havill, Steven – FINAL PAYMENT – 5.0 A Posadas County mystery with Undersheriff Estelle Reyes-Guzman. Great suspense.

Havill, Steven – HEARTSHOT (#1) – 3.0 Undersheriff Bill Gastner is still on the job in Posadas

County N.M. Up to his ears with drugs in the high school. Good mystery but ending was too drawn out.

Havill, Steven - OUT OF SEASON - 5.0

The sheriff is killed in a plane crash and undersheriff Bill Gastner takes over. The FBI is involved much to the disgust of the locals.

Hinger, Charlotte – LETHAL LINEAGE (#2) – 5.0 Lottie Albright, an editor for the county historical society in a small town in western Kansas.

Holland, Isabelle - THE LONG SEARCH - 3.0 Rev. Claire Aldington, a psychologist and Episcopal priest at St. Anselm's, in Manhattan, New York: plays a smaller role in this suspenseful mystery with a title that applies also to the ending... long.

Holland, Isabelle – FLIGHT OF THE ARCHANGEL – 3.0

Rev. Claire Aldington, a psychologist and Episcopal

priest at St. Anselm's, in Manhattan, New York: plays a small role in this mystery of murder within a family.

Meier, Leslie – ENGLISH TEA MURDER – 4.0 Better than average cozy. Lucy Stone goes to England and encounters a murder. The tour she is on has interesting travel log. Her short descriptions of the famous places visited was very enjoyable.

Pejer, Bernadette – A SPARK OF DEATH - .2.5 Set in Seattle in 1901 and deals with the advent of electricity at the University of Washington. A despised professor is found dead when President McKinley was in town and may have been the target.

Perry, Louise – A TRICK OF THE LIGHT – 5.0 Back in Three Pines with artist, art dealers and art. This series is a bit difficult to get "hooked" but when one does the books can't be put down.

West, Michael L – GOPNE WITH A HANDSOME MAN 2.5

Title better than the book.

Box, C.J. - COLD WIND - 4.0

Joe Picker, game warden in Wyoming deals with his father in law's murder and whose body is found strapped to a giant wind macine. Prime suspect is Joe's mother in law. Wonderful look at the wilderness of Wyoming.

Burpo, Todd – HEAVEN IS FOR REAL – 4.0 True story of a 4 year old boy's near death experience and his trip to heaven and back to his hospital bed.

Clark, Marcia – GUILT BY ASSOCIATION – 4.0 Los Angeles DA Rachel Knight investigates a murder / suicide involving her friend and fellow DA. Great sense of place with characters that seem very real and true to life.

Kienzle, WM, - THE ROSARY MURDERS – 3.5

Priests and nuns are being murdered and found with a rosary wrapped around their hands. Father Koesler, a Catholic priest and amateur detective, helps solve the crimes. A good fast moving mystery set in Detroit (my hometown so the streets and landmarks were enjoyable)

Mariani, Scott – THE MOZART CONSPIRACY – 4.5 British Special Air Service Officer Ben Hope is called upon to investigate the death of an old friend Oliver Llewellyn. Oliver had been doing research on the death of Mozart and it appears he has discovered a powerful underground organization.

Mosley, Walter – WHITE BUTTERFLY -3.5 Easy Rawlins set in the mid 50's in Watts area of LA. His friend, Mouse, is quite violent and a womanizer but seems to help Easy in volving the death of several prostitutes.

ROSENFELT, David – BURY THE LEAD – 4.0 Andy Carpenter's third appearance in a face paced series with lots of humor. A defense attorney and dog lover. Lots of

twists, turns and a few red herrings. Great series to follow.

Roy, Lori – BENT ROAD - 3.5

Gothic story of dysfunctional family returning to Kansas. Very dark and disturbing.

Stockett, Kathryn – TH HELP – 4.0

May have been one of the last to read this book about the civil rights movement set in the 1960's Mississippi.

Sturges, P.G. – SHORT CUT MAN – 3.0

Dick Henry can solve problems quickly but not always legally or morally. Lots of dark humor, sex and violence – definitely not for the squeamish.

Tremayne, Peter – A PRAYER FOR THE DAMNED – DNF Couldn't keep up with the foreign names and places and number of characters.

Colin, Chris – BLINDSIGHT – 3.5

This is a story about a man who had it all and lost it in an instant when his car was hit by a driver who left the scene. He suffered severe brain damage. I was absorbed in his struggle to return to a semblance of naormalcy. I don't think it was terribly well written but I was caught up in the hope of his recovery.

Kellerman, Fave – SANCTUARY - 3.0

I felt the author tried to hard to teach details that were unnecessary to further the story. It made reading not smooth. Also the characters did things that seemed unreal.

Dow, John M. – FROM WITHIN – 3.5

Zombies and ancient battles. Started off really good and very scary. ¾'s through the book it started with the ancient battle thing and wrapped up poorly. Disappointing.

Evanovich, Janet- HOT SIX – 4.5

Had a lot of very silly plotlines and I loved it. Couldn't read too many of them in a row, but laughed out loud a lot. Really liked the characters.

Finkel, Michael HERE BBEW MONSTERS – 50 DAYS AT SEA – 4.0

Having raised 4 boys, I was caught up in this very real narrative of what happened to 3 boys from a remote island when they rebelled and tried to escape the confines of the island and their attitudes about it once their ordeal was over.

Henry, Sara J. – LEARNING TO SWIM – 4.0

Young woman at loose ends sees child fall off rear of ferry, jumps in to save him. When she determines that he was thrown in on purpose she doesn't tell anyone she found him. She tries to hunt down his parents. My favorite part was the ending.

King, Stephen MILE 81 - 5.0

Best Stephen King I've read in a long time. A scary car at exit Mile 81 on the Maine turnpike where an accident and several other Good Samaritans get involved.

Lance, Max – CRAZY GIRLS – 2.0

Unremarkable multiple stories about one guy's bad dates. Had the promise to be very funny and interesting, but wasn't either.

Pittard, Hannah – THE FATES WILL FIND THEIR WAY – 2.0

I didn't totally hate this story, BUT it couldn't decide where it wanted to be. It was like sliding doors in a small community. Teen age girl goes missing, teen boy narrates. Times jump around and much is not cleared up at the end.

Stockett, Kathryn – THE HELP – 4.0

What was missing from the movie was the pure terror these women felt during the civil rights struggles of the 60's. Wonder who the books if written for? Is there still a people who need to recognized themselves or others in these stories.

Allen, Irene – QUAKER WITNESS – 4.0

An eminent paleontologist is found murdered in his lab at Harvard and the number one suspect is his graduate student. The professor's only female advisor, Elizabeth Elliot, Quacker Clerk must prove that the girl didn't do it.

Allen, Irene – Quaker Testimony – 4.0

Hope and Sheldon Laughton, a ;young Quaker couple refuse to pay their war taxes. The IRS will reposses their home and Elizabeth Elliot goes to their home for moral support, where she finds Hope murdered.

Allen, Irene – Quaker Indictment – 4.0

Elizabeth Elliot goes to Seattle to visit her ex-roommate but finds she has disappeared.

Charles, Kate – A DEAD MAN OUT OF MIND – 5.0 An English church is robbed and the priest killed. The only thing to appear to be missing is the Church's chalice. A new female curate arrives and Sollicitor Dave M iddleton Brown is hired to arrange the sale of the church silver.

Box, C.J. - NOWHERE TO RUN - 5.0

Joe Pickett is away from his family on a temporary assignment to Wyoming. Strange things have been happing in those mountains and Joe saddles up to go check them out. This could be his last assignment.

Coban, Harlan – THE FINAL DETAIL – 5.0

Myron Bolitar is in the Caribbean when Win, bad-ass sidekick, informs him that Esperanza, Myron's partner, has been arrested for murder.

Reise, Virginia and Mary C. Ailea, editors, FAMOUS DETECTIVE STORES – 1.0

Only like one of the 16 stories and that was by Rex Stout. As is usual for Nero Wolfe...Archie Goodwin investigates and Wolfe gets all the credit.

Coban. Harlan – PROMISE ME – 5.0

Edna Skylar recognizes a missing girl on the street who pleads with her to tell no one. Myron investigates.

Braun, Lilan Jackson – THE CAT WHO WENT UNDER-GROUND and THE CAT WHO BROUGHT DOWN THE HOUSE. 5.0

Jim Quilleran in Pickaxe with two Siamese cats solves various mysteries.

KAREN B

Black, Lisa – DEFENSIVE WOUNDS - #4? – 2011 – 3.0 Theresa McQueen, forensic investigator on a case of murder in a hotel with victims being offensive defense attorneys at a convention...where Theresa's daughter works and a friend of a young man acquitted of a crime of murder and rape. Far too much detail of Theresa analyzing. Mostly boring.

Burke, James Lee – THE GLASS RAINBOW - -5.0 Stunning conclusion? To the Clete and Dave . Ultimate dealing with the Ablelards and the deaths of 7 young girls. See long review articles in Review section.

Child, Lee – THE AFFAIR - # 16 – 2011- - 5.0 Excellent tale of the reason Reacher leaves the MP's .. Rather wish I could remember how many of the characters appeared in earlier books. Massive coverup that is uncovered near base in Mississippi. Thought I knew the perpetrator ...was still surprised at the resolution. Trains Rock.

Cline, Ernest – READY PLAYER ONE – 2011 – 4.9 In 2041 geeks seek hidden "easter egg" in game developers ultimate game to win his entire fortune. Developer used many scenes, games and clues from the 1980's Foreshadowed ending a tiny bit of a letdown. ...marred perfect 5.0

Cobin, Harlan – SHELTER – 2011 – 4.5

YA mystery with Mickey Boliltar. Nephew of Myron and living with him as in last series book Mickey's father was killed in a car accident and his mother overcome with grief became a drug addict. Mickey's only friend Ashley has disappeared and Mickey begins a search for answers with the help of two new friends, an overweight girl and a small make dweeb. Totally enjoyable

Culver, Chris - THE ABBEY - # 1—2.5

Ashraf Rashid, a detective can't be stopped from investigating the death of his niece...and goes against all police policy only to discover corruption and Russian Mafia and a lot of trouble. Typical plot but Ashraf is a Muslim that stops for prayers frequently and is an alcoholic, (e-book only)

Davidson, Hilary – THE DAMAGE DONE – 2010 – 4.5 Lily Moore returns to NY City when her drug addicted sister is found dead. When Lily's trip to the morgue to identify her sister reveals the body is someone else, her troubles really begin. A cop, an old gay friend, her ex- fiancé and her sister's ex lover add to her problems or her answers. A stolen identity used to cover up the real crime.

Fields, Tricia – The Territory - #1 - 2011 - 3.0Artimis, West Texas...border town where two drug cartels are hoping to gain control and provide easy US access. Police Chief, Josie Gray has her hands full with a self-centered mayor as well as the cartel war that has crossed the border. Great description of the setting – but lacking something to keep my interest very high.

Freveletti, Jamie – THE NINTH DAY - #3 – 2001 – 4.75 Once again Emma, the Chemist, gets in serious trouble...this time with Mexican Drug lard... with armadillos. Is held (not killed) to solve a medical problem. Eventually Summer, Banner and even Vanderlock come into play. First chapter of 4th is left as a teaser... I won't read it until the book is available.

Handler, David – THE BLOOD RED INDIAN SUMMER - #8 -2011- 3.75

Rather violent football player (on suspension) moves to Dorset, CT. ;both Berger and Mitry deal with their parents but find time to solve the attempted rape and murder of the ball players sister-in-law.

Harper, Karen – BLACK ORCHID – 1996 – 3.5 Jordan Quinn, home in the Everglades...with an orchid shop...a husband involved in research with panthers resistance to ;LHIV...Previous first love is now the leader of the Seminole community. Local sheriff...looks from get-go to be a villain. A little too predictable.

Haynes, Dana – BREAKING POINT - #2 - 2011 - 4.9 The NTSB group is once again investigating a plane crash this time in Montana and with 3 members of the NTSB on board. 8 people survive...but a hired killer has killed 6 more that survived the crash. ALL power was lost.

Horan, Ellen – 31 BOND STREET – 2010 – 3.75 New York 1857, famous murder case of Dr. Harvey Burdell with wife (?) being defended by Henry Clinton and prosecuted by Oakey Hall (later mayor of NY city) Somewhat fictionalized... but not much

Levine, Paul – LASSITER –#8 - 2011 – 4.0

Defense attorney Jake Lassiter reveals bad behavior some 18 years earlier and in an attempt to redeem himself, takes on a client of a young woman gone missing from a porn kingpins party. Old buddy, now the DA, attempts to convince Jake to bury the case. Jake, a pit bull, won't let the client quit.

Maron, Margaret – THREE DAY TOWN – 2011 - #17 – 4.0 While in New York for their delayed honeymoon, Judge Deborah Knott and Dwight Bryant agree to deliver a package to NYPD lieutenant Sigrid Harald, but when a doorman is murdered and the package.. goes missing, Deborah and Dwight join the investigation.

Parrish, P.J. – THE KILLING SONG – 2011 – 3..5

Not nearly as good as the series. Too many dumb interference by civilian (American in Paris) seeking the killer of his young sister, who was killed while visiting her brother. Lead sends journalist, Matt Owens to Paris where he befriends Eve, a cop seeking a serial killer from an old case. Clues lead them to London and Scotland and the catacombs of Paris. Serial killer plays games with them via musical clues.

Robb, J.D. NEW YORK TO DALLAS. 4.0 –

Eve Dallas takes Roarke on her quest to recapture McQueen (escaped pedophile) in Dallas – where Eve was found as a child, . Flashbacks occur .and she discovers much about herself. Her cat saves the day.

Rozan, S. J. – GHOST HERO – #11 - 2011 - 3.0Lydia is hired to prove a rumor of a Chinese artists work. Artist was killed at Tiananmen uprising and new paintings are rumored to be available. Ultimately rather boring and at times a bit silly. Bill plays a Russian mob boss art buyer.

Catching up with Ruth

November news letter:

Hi,

I had a good time looking through your list of clerical sleuths, and then I went through my reading log for quite a ways back, and realized that I had not read a clerical mystery in a very long time. The one that I talked about in my last Ravings was almost the one and only, for some reason. I wonder if there are fewer authors writing clerical mysteries nowadays? I think McInerny is still writing Father Dowling novels, and Kate Charles has quite a nice series featuring a young (female) curate, and there's Mark Schweitzer's Hayden Konig series (though he's an organist, not a clergyman, and lots of the clergy people are lampooned). Julia Spencer-Fleming's Claire Fergusson is wonderful, and I did read **One Was a Soldier**, as soon as it came out, and I hate to see that series end.

I do read and enjoy and look forward to Veronica Heley's Ellie Quicke series, which I suppose could be categorized as Christian mysteries, and Ellie, of course, is married to a clergyman, though she herself is definitely the central character. And I particularly like Mary Stanton's "Angels" series, which are very much about this life and the next, and they're set in Savannah, which I like, too.

I did, though, just finish a new mystery with a clerical hero: G.M. Malliet's Wicked Autumn, which introduces Max Tudor, former MI5 agent turned Anglican priest. A bossy member of his congregation is murdered, and he joins forces with the policeman from the neighboring town, Detect give Cotton, to solve the murder. There are some lovely supporting characters, including quite a dishy New Age lady, and an elderly spinster who might have known Jane Marple along the way, and the obnoxiously bumbling local copper, and a local author who's not nearly as good as he believes himself to be. And then there's Max's housekeeper, who can't cook and doesn't keep house very well, either. All nicely drawn, with a good bit of affection. And Max himself seems to have a little of Father Brown in him, in his concern for his parishioners, though he doesn't have much forgiveness for the murderer. [Oddly enough, I knew who the murder was very early, but that didn't bother me a bit. Usually it annoys me.]

Another "oddly enough:" looking back through your clerical list, I started to say that I miss some of the oldies on there, like Sister M. T., and Lee Harris's Chris Bennett, and Quaker Irene Allen, but I find that I don't. Those series ended when they should have, I think, before the characters got stale.

So--sorry I'm late with this, and I may not have any holiday turkeys to complain about this year--I'm getting better at avoiding them, maybe. Although I just looked at my "statistics," and I had nine Did Not Finishes, so there must have been <u>some</u> turkeys in there. In fact, I'm beginning to remember at least one of them. Good! I'll have something to grouse about.

Bits and Pieces

Jussi Adler-Olsen's Department Q Mysteries to be Adapted for Film and Television

Adaptations of Danish crime novelist Jussi Adler-Olsen's first four titles in his "Department Q" series are being planned for film and television. First up will be **THE KEEPER OF LOST CAUSES** which introduces homicide detective and cold case investigator Carl Mørck. Louise Vesth will write the screenplay. Denmark's Zentropa is producing with Danish commercial channel TV2 and German public broadcaster ZDF as partners. Production is expected to begin Fall 2012 with the first film premiering about a year later. Mysterious Reviews called this police procedural a "fine start to this series". The case involves a missing woman, a politician who vanished without a trace five years earlier. The world assumes she's dead. Mørck's colleagues snicker about the time he's wasting. "The pieces of the puzzle are all in the five-year-old file, and it's a pleasure following Mørck along as he puts them together." **THE KEEPER OF LOST CAUSES** is the only book in this series translated into English to date.

Adler-Olsen, Jussi THE KEEPER OF LOST CAUSES 2011 takes place in Denmark and details one of the most horrific crimes in memory, yet keeps the reader turning pages to see what happens.

Baldacci, David ZERO DAY 2011 is a thriller and page-turner. I thought this one was every bit as good as any by Lee Child. I omitted Lee Childs THE AFFAIR from my list because of tedious descriptions of sex, meals, and railroad tracks.

Franklin, Tom CROOKED LETTER, CROOKED LETTER 2010 was an outstanding character study.

Hart, John IRON HOUSE 2011 was a dark, well-written and plotted character study of two brothers partly raised in the orphanage called Iron House.

Johnson, Craig HELL IS EMPTY 2011 deserves mention for his literary achievement and writing in this long slog through freezing temperatures.

Krueger, William Kent NORTHWEST ANGLE 2011 was unforgettable due to the dereco (storm) and the baby, as well as an area I knew nothing about: the Northwest Angle.

Mankell, Henning THE TROUBLED MAN 2011 was the last in the Kurt Wallender series and a downer, but so well-written! Patterson, Richard North THE DEVILS LIGHT 2011 impressed perhaps because of its timely locations: Pakistan and Lebanon.

Penny, Louise A TRICK OF THE LIGHT 2011 overused chiaroscuro but thats minor compared to the delight in returning to Three Pines.

Spencer-Fleming, Julia—ONE WAS A SOLDIER 2011 is the best Ive read about PTSD.

Stabenow, Dana THOUGH NOT DEAD 2011 offers an overview of Alaskan history and a good mystery.

Walker, Martin BLACK DIAMOND (2011 in U.S.) managed to enlighten readers about truffles (black diamonds), the French -Algerian war , gangs in the south of France, and Brunos culinary talents.

Winspear, Jacqueline A LESSON IN SECRETS 2011 was not quite as good as others; perhaps it was the academic setting. This is a favorite series, always well-written.

I hesitate to recommend THE HYPNOTIST by Lars Kepler (Alexandra Coelho Ahndoril and Alexander Ahndoril, both well-known Swedish writers.) It was one of the most violent books in memory, yet I lost two nights sleep reading it.
